The Art and Science of Happiness

This fall, 12 SLR members learned more about Happiness through the capable leadership of Diana Lloyd with assistance by Jane Auger. In our 6 weeks together, we discovered it IS possible to increase our happiness through intentional actions such as

Having a strong social connection

Physical exercise such as 3 20-minute walks per week

Keeping a happiness journal (documenting experiences that made you feel happy and then reading them)

Doing acts of kindness

Meditating

Becoming totally immersed in a project or activity

Being grateful (expressing 5 times per week)

Creating time for yourself.

We reviewed books related to Positive Psychology (the study of happiness) and watched TED talks and videos on the topic so we could discuss during the class sessions.

We learned that people who feel happy have stronger immune systems, are more likely to survive serious illnesses, are more resilient during difficult times, have strong relationships, can achieve more success.

Creating opportunities to laugh via films, television, books, and music can increase our happiness levels.

One of the amazing outcomes of the Happiness course were the many acts of kindness done to support the clients of the Men's Mission and Ark Aid. Class members donated items and money (to purchase items) including winter coats, mittens, men's underwear and more.
